DOE names all Gwinnett high schools as “AP Honor Schools”

All Gwinnett County school clusters have a reason to celebrate today as each of the school district’s traditional high schools and a system charter school have been named a “2012 AP (Advanced Placement) Honor School” by State Superintendent of Schools Dr. John Barge. In making the announcement, Dr. Barge said, “Georgia has much to be proud of when it comes to the success of Advanced Placement. Much of this success can be attributed to the dedication to rigor and excellence at each of our AP Honor Schools.”

Out of the 367 schools which earned the honor from across the state, 19 of them serve Gwinnett high school students. That number grew from 17 in 2011 and 12 schools in 2010. Additionally, several GCPS schools were recognized in more than one category.

The Gwinnett schools recognized this year are:

AP STEM Schools: All 18 Gwinnett traditional high schools and one charter school earned this honor

(Schools with students testing in at least two AP Mathematics courses and two AP Science courses. These courses are AP Calculus AB, AP Calculus BC, AP Statistics, AP Biology, AP Chemistry, AP Environmental Science, AP Physics B, AP Physics C, AP Computer Science.)

“We are proud to see the hard work of our students and teachers come to fruition,” says **Clay Hunter**, principal of South Gwinnett High, a school which earned recognition as an AP STEM School and an AP Access and Support School. “Our recognition as an AP Honor School is a byproduct of our focus on South Gwinnett’s theme— ‘College, Not If, But Where!’” In congratulating his students and staff, Mr. Hunter recognizes a grant the school received which allowed for teachers to participate in staff development sessions on AP curriculum and strategies. South Gwinnett High students also have a support system, that includes tutorial hours and a student initiated club with a focus on AP content.

Lanier High’s recognition as an AP STEM School, an AP Access and Support School, and an AP Challenge School is especially significant as the school is fairly new, having opened in 2010. Principal **Kerensa Wing** is excited to learn her students earned recognition in three different categories in their first year of eligibility. “As we opened Lanier High, our stakeholders expected us to continue to offer the same level of rigor to which our students were accustomed,” says Ms. Wing. “A commitment by the leadership team and our teacher leaders to provide high-level learning opportunities for Lanier High students was one of our non-negotiables as we set our course. The recognition for this accomplishment belongs to the students who stepped up to the challenge and Lanier High’s incredibly talented and hard working group of AP teachers that led our students to success in these classes. Lanier High’s goal is to see the students continue to challenge themselves and be successful in an extraordinary manner.”

(Schools with students testing in at least two AP Mathematics courses and two AP science courses and at least 40% of the exam scores on AP Mathematics and AP science exams earning scores of three (3) or higher.)
